

SUNSHINE FESTIVAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS



Lyle Harris is one of the Mid West's best known personalities. The acknowledged king of country radio he has worked for 6GE for thirty years, many of them as General Manager. His community work is prodigious and includes major fund-raising appeals for natural disaster funds such as the Dwellingup fires and for many other worthy causes: the most obvious being for the construction of Queens Park Theatre of which Lyle was chief proponent. On the formation of the Tourist Bureau and Promotion Directorate in 1984, this former Town Mayor was elected Chairman, a post which is one of the many public offices he now holds.



Don Grayson is the Chairman of the Sunshine Festival Committee and together with his wife is a successful owner/operator of two Geraldton businesses. After moving from Perth to Geraldton seven years ago Don has become firmly committed to the principle of community projects and is now serving his second term as Chairman of the Sunshine Festival Committee.



As Executive Officer of the Tourist Bureau and Promotion Directorate John Kruiskomp is a driving force behind the creation of the Batavia Coast concept. For this he is amply suited, having been involved in tourism and marketing all his working life, including positions as Marketing Manager for Fremantle Sailing Club, Ell Caballo Blanco and Audieus World Tours. Joke Newby has a wealth of theatre and arts experience in both administrative and artistic fields. He has worked and travelled extensively throughout Australia and overseas, toured and administered youth companies, ballet, opera, bush bands, theatre and other art forms. He is the General Manager of Perth's Hole in the Wall Theatre and was a major force in the design, funding and creation of a new home for that company in 1984. This is his first experience at the organisation of a festival.



Bill Moson is the Manager of the Queens Park Theatre, a position he has held for two years, during which time he has vigorously and successfully promoted the development of the arts and entertainment. Previous positions include Administrator of the Hole in the Wall Theatre, Managing Director of Mason-Miller Pty Ltd, and Tour Manager for the WA Arts Council. Originally a Porn, subsequently a Sandgroper, he would now like to audition to be a Geraldtonian.



Festival Committee Treasurer **Denise Johnson** is married with three children—a Brownie, a Scout and a Girl Guide. She has travelled and lived throughout much of Western Australia and is Assistant Accountant at Pass Newton. Denise's interests include the Girl Guiding movement (she is Treasurer of the Bluff Point group), squash and sailing Windrush 14's.



For all his life Merv Heinrich has worked on and owned land, originally at North Baandee and since 1966 in the Chapman Valley. His property, Murphyl Farm, encompasses some 2400 hectares of the Moresby Ranges and is presently being developed as a tourist centre. Married with four daughters and two sons, Merv is a fine example of the drive needed to develop this region's tourist industry.

Judy Woodworth is perhaps best known in Geraldton for her aerobics classes and demonstrations. A keen sportswoman and traveller, Judy has this year taken on one of the most difficult and enjoyable of all Festival duties, that of Co-ordinator of the Festival Queen Quest.

ABOUT THE SUNSHINE FESTIVAL . . .

The Geraldton Sunshine Festival was first conceived and created by the Geraldton Retail Traders Association in 1959, when the then President of the Association Mr John Jordan Johnstone proposed an idea to improve trade and holiday enjoyment during the August school holidays. A 'Tomato Festival' was planned, and subsequently changed to the 'Geraldton Sunshine Festival' to encompass the whole of the community for whom it was designed.

In this the twenty seventh Festival another minor name change has been made to widen the scope of activities to embrace more fully the Batavia Coast region of which Geraldton is the main centre. The recent launch of the Batavia Coast promotion is a clear guide for future development of our region and the Festival Committee welcomes the next logical step in the Festival's evolution; wider participation from organisations outside the immediate Geraldton connurbation, and a greater sharing of the Festival's presentations with outlying areas.

The major reasons for and activities of the 1985 Batavia Coast Geraldton Sunshine Festival remain unchanged; it is presented for, by and with the community in which we all live or are holidaying. It remains for excellent reasons the oldest community festival of its type in the state. We can all be very proud of that achievement.





This is a beautifully pleasant way for local residents and holidaymakers to learn a little about the history of Geraldton and its immense importance to the early development of Western Australia. Take a stroll into the past, it's a fascinating story.

GERALDTON ART GALLERY: (All Festival Week, 10am to 5pm daily)

For this, the twenty seventh Geraldton Sunshine Festival, the participation of the Geraldton Art Gallery is two-fold. The Geraldton Art Society proudly sponsors the Junior Art Competition, aimed at developing the talents of our youngest local artists, which will be judged on Monday September 2 at 11.30 by Mr Ray Sampson, Superintendent of Arts and Crafts in the WA Education Department, and Harry Bluck, Chairman of the W.A. Arts Council. Selected works from this competition will be hung in the gallery throughout Festival Week. The Friends of the Gallery will hold a brief preview of the exhibition before the awards, admission \$2. The major exhibition will be internationally renowned Australian artist Sidney Nolan's acclaimed wildflower series, and to complement this the Geraldton branch of the Wildflower Association will display a small selection of W.A.'s native flowers. Of course to see a full wildflower display you should go to the Old Presbyterian Church in Lester Avenue.

TOWN LIBRARY: (Festival Week, Town Library)

The masterpieces of Geraldton's most famous literary son, the internationally renowned Randolph Stow, come into focus in a special Festival Display mounted by the Civic Library. Boris the Bookworm will make a special visit to the library on Saturday August 31 to meet younger readers.

NAVY RESERVE CADETS REGATTA:

(Festival Week, daily on the harbour)

Winners of the Efficiency Trophy and AMP Efficiency Shield, the Geraldton Naval Cadets from T.S. Morrow will be battling it out against seven other units from across the state in the Cadets State Regatta.

And for a touch of local pride, join the T.S. Morrow Cadets as they March in the Colours in front of Queens Park Theatre immediately after the Float Parade.

GERALDTON RSL ANNIVERSARY:

(Saturday August 31 to Saturday September 7, Birdwood House)

1985 is the Golden Anniversary Year for Birdwood House and in celebration the RSL offers an armed services display all festival week. On Saturday September 7 there will be a wreath laying service at 6.30pm before the Special Reunion Dinner at 7.30pm. Reunion Dinner tickets can be bought prior to August 25 by phoning Ben Cunningham on 21 1916.

GERALDTON MUSEUM: (Daily, see diary for details of opening times)

The very popular holiday programme run by the Geraldton Museum during the school vacations is on again at the Museum's Maritime Display building near the yellow submarine in Marine Terrace.
