This year's eight Princesses are no exception . . . over the last eight weeks they have run cake stalls and raffles, dinners, dances, cocktail parties, quiz nights and fashion parades, each with their own supporting committees, through many hours of preparation, rehearsal, creativity and sheer hard work. The rewards for this exist partly in the satisfaction of knowing they have done their job well, of establishing new and bonding friendships with fellow princesses and their supporters. But there can be and should be more reward than this: thus, every year is chosen a Festival Queen and a Charity Queen, and since last year an Encouragement Award for the girl who has made the most enthusiastic contribution towards the success of the Quest.

This year the Sunshine Festival Queen will carry off a major prize consisting of a trip for two to Hong Kong flying QANTAS and Ansett WA. In Hong Kong she will stay at the brand new Grand Tower Hotel, courtesy of the Asian holiday specialists 'The Holiday Factory' of Perth, and will receive \$250 in traveller's cheques from the R & I Bank as well as a full size colour portrait from Lou Checker Photographics.

The Charity Queen will receive an Ansett WA trip for two to Yulara and the Encouragement Award will be a \$300 clothing voucher from Wrights Fashion Salon.

SHARP McKEATING'S GRAND FLOAT PARADE (Saturday September 20 at 1pm, Marine Terrace & Cathedral Ave)

The Twenty-eighth annual Batavia Coast Geraldton Super



The Twenty-eighth annual Batavia Coast Geraldton Sunshine Festival puts its best foot forward in traditional style with the Grand Parade, this year sponsored by the Sharp Corporation and McKeatings Business Equipment.
