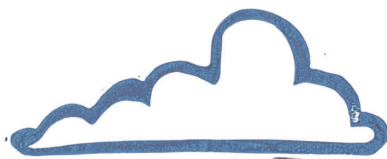

Future Forward: When I first encountered the theme Future Forward, my mind went straight to AI and digitally driven creative spaces. But I kept circling back to a different idea of the future, one that resists that pull. I imagine a kind of quiet uprising, where people return to slower, tactile processes: typewriters, hand drawn illustration, writing in journals with nice pens. This piece sits in that tension. It combines traditional printmaking and carving with digital intervention, using an image of my vintage typewriter that I translated into a digital line drawing before bringing it back into a physical collage. It moves between mediums, but always returns to the hand. I wanted to make something deliberate, imperfect, and human.

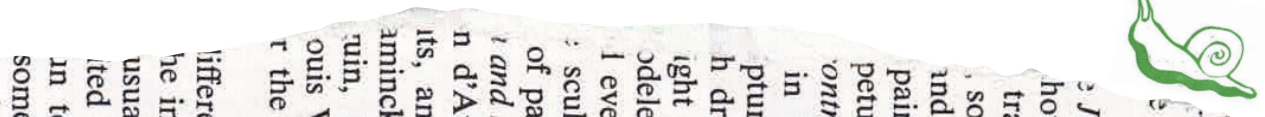

Join us this October as we bring new, entertaining, and innovative queer cinema to Geraldton.

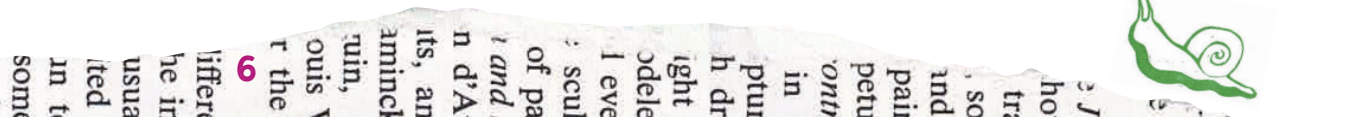

BIG SKY Guest Biographies

Bernice Barry writes historical fiction and non-fiction, reflecting her passion for discovering and telling women's stories, dimmed or obscured by time. She has lived for twenty-five years on Wadandi country near Margaret River, researching local history and nurturing a native garden. *The Names of a Hare* is her fourth book.

Coral Carter is a poet, who lives in Perth but grew up in Kalgoorlie. She has three publications *Descended from Thieves* (Mulla Mulla Press 2012), *Backyard Listening* (Mulla Mulla Press 2019) and *Good Grief* which was longlisted in Five Islands manuscript competition 2024 and published by Mulla Mulla Press 2026.

Li Cunxin AO's remarkable life is recounted in his memoir *Mao's Last Dancer*, which is one of the most successful autobiographies of all time. It was published around the world and has been adapted into a young readers' edition, a picture book, a stage play and a major motion picture. Li's new book, *The Lucky Son – sequel to Mao's Last Dancer*, continues his inspirational journey. It's about life, family, following one's heart, and gratitude.

Mark C. Evans - Award-winning children's author and professional actor Mark C. Evans delivers literary events with humour and high-energy storytelling. His internationally published books have captivated audiences around the world. As a former Geraldton Primary School student he returns home to combine performance, audience interaction and imagination to inspire young readers and writers.

Kylie Howarth loves the ocean and claims to be part fish. She's an award-winning, internationally published children's author and illustrator from Western Australia who creates accessible books for struggling readers, and was the recipient of the 2024 WA Premier's Book Awards, Writers Fellowship.

Caitlin Maling is a Western Australian poet with six books of poetry published (as of September 2026), her most recent book is *Midwest* out with Upswell Publishing. She teaches in the Discipline of Writing at Curtin University and lives near Walyalup/Fremantle with her young family.



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Geraldine Mellet has been a pate seller, pamphlet deliverer, telemarketer, apprentice puppeteer, philanthropy hunter, disability rights advocate, columnist, filmmaker and broadcast journalist. However she most identifies as someone who cannot live without reading and writing and is proud to have released her first novel, *Things I Cannot Say*.

Angela Nikulinsky is a business woman, designer, gardener and botany student. She is driven to share Philippa's extraordinary artwork far and wide.

Philippa Nikulinsky AM is a self taught artist whose work begins far from the studio - camping in remote corners of WA, painting the flora and fauna she finds there.

Bruce Pascoe is an Aboriginal farmer and writer of literary fiction, non-fiction, poetry, essays and children's literature, based on Yuin Country. His publications have won numerous awards including the NSW Premier's Award for Literature, the Booksellers Association Prize and the CBCA Eve Pownall award. He is the author of the groundbreaking, bestselling book *Dark Emu*.

Holden Sheppard is a Geraldton-born author whose novel *Invisible Boys* won multiple awards, became a bestseller and was adapted as a Peabody Award-nominated TV series with Stan Australia. His new novel *Yeah the Boys* is the long-awaited sequel. He lives in Perth's north with his husband and his V8 ute.

Tess Woods writes modern fiction set in exotic locations starring women of all ages and the occasional bloke. After giving up writing for a few years, she gave it one more crack with *The Venice Hotel* which became an instant Australian Top 10 bestseller, was sold in a bidding war overseas and was shortlisted as the Australian fiction book of the year. So she decided not to quit after all and is back again with the book of her heart and her heritage, *The Cairo Bridal Shop*. Tess is also a physiotherapist with her own private practice and she's a mother of two. She runs a street library, she's a proud ambassador for A Land For All and she's the creator and director of Perth's largest literary festival, the Festival of Fiction, which is now in its third year.



Festival Presenters & Creatives



Peter Salmon is a 92-year-old Thiinma Elder and the last fluent speaker of his language. Having spent his life working across pastoral stations in Western Australia, Peter carries a profound knowledge of Country across the state. Together with musician Rosie Sitorus, Peter writes and performs songs in Thiinma to share his language with the world.

Rosie Sitorus is a singer-songwriter, linguist and creative producer whose practice transforms creativity into meaningful cultural impact. Working with communities across Western Australia, her portfolio includes the award-winning songwriting project Warralgurniya and the production Piyalbajarri, created with Thiinma Elder Peter Salmon, with whom she appeared on ABC TV's The Piano in 2026.



Antonia Naarstig grew up in Geraldton and later devoted her time to pursuing the creative arts, studying at Claremont Art School, WAAPA, UWA, Sussex, and Oxford Universities. Her love of oil paint has been a lifelong passion, resulting in numerous portraits, two of which have been submitted to the Archibald Prize; Caitlin Cassidy (2020) and Holden Sheppard (2026).

Hayley Savage is an artist, muralist, teacher, and the person behind Sunflower Studio - a gallery, workshop space, and creative hub where people of all ages, abilities, skill levels and neurotypes can feel comfortable walking through the door and creating something cool.



Kristen Hogue has been teaching Art to Primary aged children for around 30 years. She believes that the perfect formula is KIDS + FUN + CREATIVITY = LEARNING. The creative mind of a child does not have boundaries and I love to plant a seed of an idea and watch those seeds grow.

Anne Williams is a local music teacher by day and a musician, comedian and Emcee by night. She has lived in Geraldton for the last 22 years and is regularly seen participating in various ways at local fundraisers and events.

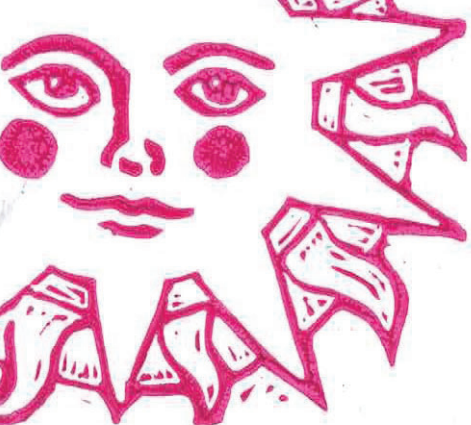
